a guide for prospective residents



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Introduction Welcome to this introduction to life in Guernsey. As someone who is thinking of moving to the island, or who has already committed to move, you are sure to have many questions about the practicalities of living here. This guide is designed to give you an overview of the practical side of Guernsey life. It should not be seen as definitive but will provide some of the information that you need to make your transition a little easier.

Immigration and Nationality

Guernsey is a very special place to live. The island's spectacular scenery paired with its vibrant economy and enviable location create a way of life that its residents hold dear.

The rules governing who can live and work in the island are fairly straightforward and have been established in order to protect Guernsey's environment and to preserve her resources.

Essentially, if you are a British Citizen, (or have the right to live in the UK and her islands) or are a national from the European Economic Area or Switzerland, then you are able to live and work in Guernsey. However, there are strict controls on the admission of non-EEA nationals to Guernsey (and the Bailiwick) and immigration work permit controls are also in place for such nationals.

Visa requirements for entry to the Bailiwick are the same as those required to enter the UK and further information can be obtained by contacting the Immigration and Nationality Division or, if resident abroad, a British Diplomatic Mission.

If you have any specific questions regarding your personal situation, or are unsure about your immigration status, you are advised to contact the island's authorities.

Housing

Because the island has a limited housing stock and only a small land bank available for residential use, Guernsey has a unique housing control system.

Established in the 1960s, this system splits the housing stock into two tiers: the Open Market and the Local Market. Although there are no restrictions on buying property in Guernsey, there are restrictions on occupation.

The Housing Control Law specifies who may legally occupy property in Guernsey. In essence, Local Market properties are only available to those who hold residential qualifications or who have been granted a housing licence, while Open Market properties are more widely available.

Becoming a Qualified Resident

In general terms, anyone born in Guernsey of Guernsey parents and who has spent at least ten years of their childhood here, or is married to someone with residential qualifications and has spent at least ten consecutive years on the island as their spouse, can apply to become a Qualified Resident.

The Open Market

Any British or EU national can take up residence in an Open Market home. Anyone who buys an Open Market home automatically has a right to live in that home and work on the island.

There are approximately 1600 Open Market homes on the register and there are a number of estate agencies on the island that can help find the right accommodation for you.

Housing Licences

Housing licences are granted to people brought to the island to take up roles that cannot be filled by a residentially qualified person and which are considered essential to the community. Licences are, for the most part, issued to people holding specific professional qualifications.

The licences allow holders to occupy Local Market properties and are valid for a fixed period, such as three, five or, in exceptional cases, 15 years. If you have an essential licence, it also covers your partner and children.

Short -Term Licences

Lasting for periods ranging from nine months to three years, short-term licences are granted to people wishing to work in industries such as tourism and horticulture when there is not enough local labour available. These allow holders to live in Local Market accommodation, but don't cover dependents. Holders need to leave the island for a minimum break of three months when the licence expires before a new licence will be issued

Right to Work Law

Before you can work on the island, including in a self-employed capacity, you must have a valid Right to Work document. These are issued by the Housing Department and confirm that you are legally housed on the island - housing licences serve as a Right to Work document but only for the person named on the licence.

It is an offence for you to work without one of these documents or for an employer to employ someone who does not have one.

Health

Guernsey boasts an excellent health service with modern facilities staffed by experts in their fields.

The UK's National Health Service does not operate in the island. Instead the island's Social Security Department (SSD) runs a specialist health insurance scheme, health insurance scheme), opticians and dentists. covering the cost of most specialist care available from the Medical Specialist Group (this provides Guernsey has an excellent hospital offering both inemergency and elective specialist medical services on a consultant-only basis) and specialist physiotherapy provided by the Guernsey Physiotherapy Group.

The scheme is funded through either earnings-related or income-related insurance contributions and all new residents are granted immediate cover. Once you register for contributions you are eligible for benefits which cover part of the cost of GP visits and bring prescription charges down to a nominal amount.

Outside of the health insurance scheme residents are responsible for meeting the costs of medical care. These include treatment from their GP, chiropodists, physiotherapists (for treatment not covered by the

and out-patient care. Treatment and accommodation is not usually charged here, unless a patient elects to be treated privately. Charges are made to patients for attendance to Accident and Emergency, costs are displayed in the department's reception area.

A number of private hospital and medical insurance schemes are operated in the island, if you wish to opt for private medical treatment or wish to take out cover in addition to that included in the Health Insurance Scheme.

Please note that visitors to the island are advised to take out insurance cover, especially in relation to repatriation following an accident or injury on the island.

Ambulance Services

The St. John Ambulance & Rescue Service provides 24-hour professional ambulance services on the island. However, because there is no National Health Service in Guernsey patients are charged if they receive treatment or transport in an ambulance.

Because of this, the Service operates a subscription scheme. Members pay an annual fee and in return any ambulance services they may need during the year are free. Contact the Service for details of this scheme.

The ambulance station also has a first aid room where treatment is offered free of charge, though you will have to pay any fees that arise from then being referred to a doctor or hospital, or if you need ambulance transport.

St John's maintains a large selection of equipment for the disabled. These items are available for sale or hire and you can get full details of this service by contacting the Service direct.

Education

Guernsey's education system provides free schooling for all students up to the age of 18. There are also three private single sex colleges, which cater for pupils from age five upwards. School is compulsory for all children between the ages of five and sixteen with most pupils being admitted into primary education at the beginning of the school year in which they will reach the age of five.

Pupils in the private colleges may continue to follow courses in their own institutions, but all pupils are eligible for entry to either the Grammar School Sixth Form or to the College of Further Education, as long as they achieve the minimum entry qualifications.

Special Educational Needs

Wherever possible, pupils with special educational needs, including physical disabilities, are integrated with support into mainstream schools.

Children whose educational needs cannot be met in this way will attend one of two special schools on the island: one for pupils aged 4-11 and the other for pupils aged 11-18.

In addition, support is offered to pupils, their parents and schools by the following services:

- Sensory and Physical Impairment Service
- Communication and Autism Support Service
- The Literacy Support Service
- The Service for Pupils with Social, Emotional and Behavioural Difficulties
- The Educational Psychology Service
- The Education Welfare Service

In a few cases residential placements on the mainland are made for pupils whose educational needs cannot be met in Guernsey.

Higher Education Awards

The Education Department makes awards to assist students resident in Guernsey who enrol on higher education courses in the UK. A loan scheme will be introduced in 2009 alongside the current grant award scheme.

Social Security

Social Insurance

Guernsey's Social Insurance Scheme provides the people of Guernsey with a range of social, health and long-term care benefits, such as pensions, unemployment benefit and maternity benefit. All residents above school leaving age are liable to pay contributions at a rate that is dependent upon your employment status.

If you have been paying into the UK scheme, or certain other countries' schemes, reciprocal agreements are in place to help you access these benefits.

Income Tax

Guernsey has a system of income tax under which deductions are made from employment income (The E.T.I. scheme). The standard rate for individuals is 20p in the pound, but a number of generous personal allowances are available.

New residents will be given a tax number and coding notice when they start work and this should generally enable your employer to deduct the right amount of tax. For those in business, assessments are issued with tax payable in two instalments; by end of June and December.

There is no capital gains tax, capital transfer tax, estate duty, inheritance tax, purchase tax, turnover tax, value added tax or wealth tax.

For most companies the standard tax rate is set at 0%, although certain income is charged at either 10% or 20%.

Rates and Taxes

All island property is subject to a Tax on Real Property and bills are issued automatically.


Residents are also liable for parish rates which cover refuse collection and other services.

Customs and Excise

Import duty is liable on goods imported from outside of the European Union. However, you may get relief from this with respect to personal and household effects.

Wines, spirits or tobacco products are liable to excise duty at local rates.

Guernsey also prohibits or restricts the import of a number of goods. These include controlled drugs, arms, ammunition, explosives, offensive weapons, indecent or obscene articles, endangered species, certain animals and animal products and certain plants and potatoes.

Pet Travel

Your pet cats and dogs can travel without a Pet Passport if they travel directly between the United Kingdom and Guernsey.

Pet cats and dogs travelling from Europe (or UK pets which have travelled to Europe and are returning via Guernsey) must use the (only) approved route operated by Condor Ferries from St Malo.

Pets travelling from Europe must have a Pet Passport and must have been given tick and tapeworm treatments before embarking for Guernsey as required by the Pet Travel Scheme. Pets will be checked for conformity with the Scheme at St.Malo and those that fail will not be allowed to board the ferry for Guernsey. Please contact Condor Ferries regarding travelling with your pet before making travel arrangements.

Driving and Vehicle Licensing

Registering Your Car

Your Driving Licence

New residents need to apply to exchange their foreign licence for a Guernsey driving licence within one year of arriving in the island. Any foreign licence will become invalid for exchange or use on the island after that time

You can exchange licences issued by many countries,

including the UK and other EU members, for a Guernsey licence. However, there are a number of countries whose licences cannot be exchanged. In such cases, you will have to apply for a provisional driving licence and then pass a theory and practical driving test before you can be issued with a full Guernsey licence.

Company Registration

The new Guernsey Registry, which opened in July 2008, offers a low-cost, fast and customer-friendly way to register a company in the island.

Using this updated system, the maximum time for incorporation is 24 hours and this will cost approximately £100, excluding professional fees. The new Registry can also process incorporations in two hours, and in specific cases within 15 minutes, for a higher fee.

Intellectual Property in the Bailiwick of Guernsey

Intellectual property rights allow the creator or owner of trade marks, industrial designs, copyright and patents amongst others to benefit from their work or investment.

Recent changes in Guernsey's legislation to protect these rights have given the island one of the most modern intellectual property environments anywhere in the world. The move from a court-based system to a modern administrative service offered by The Intellectual Property Office, will ensure that the

registration of these rights is more accessible and cost effective than ever before.

Individuals and organisations can be assured that the robust framework offered in this area of law will enable them to protect, manage and exploit their intellectual property assets in the Bailiwick of Guernsey's offshore jurisdiction.

Proposed developments in the future will include the reregistration of patents under an administrative process and the registration of image rights by individuals or entities – a service not yet available in any other jurisdiction.
